am honored—on behalf of University of Maryland Global Campus (UMGC) and the more than 90,000 learners we serve each year—to introduce the remarkable exhibition Joseph Sheppard: Scenes of Figurative Narration.

Sheppard has a profound connection to UMGC, where a cultural arts center—the Leroy Merritt Center for the Art of Joseph Sheppard—bears his name, displays his work, and serves as an enduring testament to his impact on the arts community in Maryland and around the world. This space is a focal point in our Adelphi, Maryland, headquarters and functions as a resource for scholars, patrons, and students of the arts.

A native of Maryland, Sheppard was born in Owings Mills in 1930 and launched an artistic career that has spanned almost eight decades, beginning with his studies at the Maryland Institute College of Art (MICA). He would later return to MICA as an instructor, inspiring a generation of artists to launch their own careers with his mastery of realism.

Scenes of Figurative Narration represents a milestone compilation of Sheppard's works, depicting a remarkable array of subjects informed by his passion for realism and his studies of the old masters. In hosting exhibitions like this, our Arts Program expands on and supports our public mission—celebrating the learning journey, introducing unique perspectives and worldviews to new and broader audiences, and serving as a reminder of the power of education and of art to touch and transform lives.

I hope you enjoy this unique collection and are inspired, as I am, by Sheppard's remarkable talent and mastery.


oseph Sheppard, a longtime friend of the Arts Program at UMGC, is a master of the art style of realism—a style that depicts the subject with accuracy and authenticity, often focusing on everyday life. His varied artworks include historical depictions that he has carefully researched.

Sheppard studied at MICA with Jacques Maroger, former technical director of the Louvre, from 1948 to 1952. He was artist-in-residence at Dickinson College in Pennsylvania from 1956 to 1957, when he was awarded a Guggenheim Fellowship to study in Florence, Italy. Sheppard returned to MICA to teach painting, anatomy, and life drawing from 1960 to 1975. Some of his commissioned public works in Baltimore include the bronze of baseball player Brooks Robinson (2011), the statue of Pope John Paul II (2008) at the Basilica of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and the Holocaust Memorial sculpture (1988). Among several murals in the city are Schaefer's Splash at the National Aquarium (2019) and seven large paintings in the Baltimore City Police Department (1972). His portraits include President George H. W. Bush; Senator Barbara Mikulski; Cardinals Lawrence Shehan, William H. Keeler, and John P. Foley; and Pope Benedict XVI.

Sheppard has been awarded numerous honors, including the 27th International Award of St. Francis and Claire of Assisi (2019); the Tuscan American Association Award (2016); the 18th Annual International Award, Pietrasanta and Vesilia (2008); and the Gold Medal, Percival Dietsch Prize, from the National Sculpture Society (1994). He was named Sports Artist of the Year in 2015 by the U.S. Sports Academy. His work can be found in galleries and museums throughout Italy and the United States, including the Smithsonian National Portrait Gallery in Washington, D.C.

UMGC is proud to present this body of works that show-case Sheppard's talent as a master realist painter.




I believe that technical skill is an important element in art.




Iris on a Hillside 2010, oil on canvas, 39½ x 59½ in.




Fiori da Rita 2001, oil on canvas, 83 x 69 in.




Expulsion circa 1995, oil on board, 40 x 40 in.




Football 2001, oil on canvas, 60×69 in.


Rock and Roll






